Explore Your Options



When you know about your personality and interests and have an idea about careers that you might want to pursue, it is a good idea to learn about various occupations and their educational requirements and future prospects. The following resources will get you started.

- For dozens of different kinds of industries—such as <u>healthcare</u>, <u>business and financial</u> <u>services</u>, and <u>computer and information services</u> — the <u>Occupational Outlook Handbook</u> from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics tells you about occupations in the industry, training and advancement, earnings, expected job prospects, and working conditions.
- <u>O*Net Online</u> provides a service to search for career options based on career clusters, career outlook, industry, and job zone.
- <u>MyNextMove.org</u> provides a search tool that allows you to search by industry.
- The <u>Occupational Outlook Handbook</u> contains general information about different careers, including the training and education they require, earnings potential, job prospects, what workers do on the job, and working conditions.
- <u>Ohio Department of Job and Family Services</u> provides a series of links to websites which give helpful information on jobs available in Ohio.
- <u>The Bureau of Labor Statistics</u> has an Occupation Finder that lets you search for an occupation by education level, projected growth rate, 2012 median income and other categories.
