Policy Information Manual Updates

We are bringing forward recommended changes to the College's Policy and Information Manual. Three documents are included in the packet for your consideration; one outlines an entire new section on faculty credentialing which Dr. Roades will present, one deals only with Information Technology policy, and one is a compilation of general College policies. We will ask for the Board's approval of these policies in one action item.

Grand Opening of Robert W. Plaster Free Enterprise Center

I was honored to speak alongside a host of dignitaries at the opening and naming ceremony of the Robert W. Plaster Free Enterprise Center at Ohio Christian University on August 31. As you will recall, Southern State is the public institution that partnered with OCU to make the public funding of this center possible. The \$5 million, 24,000-square-foot facility utilized 37 percent federal funding, 19 percent state money, and 44 percent private and local funding, including a grant from the Plaster Foundation created by the late Empire Gas founder Robert Plaster for whom the building is named. We look forward to working with OCU to use this resource to spur innovation, entrepreneurship, and increased economic opportunity throughout southern Ohio.

Flag Display at Central Campus

Six hundred and sixty flags are on display along U.S. 62 north at Central Campus to remember the soldiers, sailors, airmen and marines who take their own lives every month around the country. This display was coordinated by volunteers with Support Our Troops of Highland County. The display is scheduled to be moved every 30 days to different sites in the county.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Technical Program Enrollments Experience Slight Uptick for Fall 2017

During a time when community colleges across the nation grapple with challenging enrollment trends, Southern State is pleased to see a noticeable boost in technical program enrollments across several degree programs. Overall, there has been a roughly 14 percent increase in technical program enrollments for Fall 2017. Several have experienced a double-digit increase including Office Services, Entrepreneurship, Interactive Media, Cyber Security, and Electrical/Electronics. This is a welcome trend alongside a record high, 73 percent course fill-rate overall. The faculty, staff, and administrators involved in these outcomes should be commended for their outstanding efforts to balance enrollment growth with efficiency standards.

Faculty Senate Approves Policy on Hiring Qualified Faculty

In order to meet the multi-dimensional academic mission of the College to remediate students, prepare students for the workforce or transfer, and to provide continuing education, it is incumbent on the institution to hire highly qualified faculty in all areas. It is imperative that hiring standards are consistent with the guidelines as provided by

the Ohio Department of Higher Education and the Higher Learning Commission. As outlined in the SSEA/SSCC Contract in Section 7.06, it is the position of the College to follow the most rigorous of the two entities. This credential standard applies to all instruction regardless of delivery methodology or content.

Effective September 2017, the Higher Learning Commission updated the guidelines for determining qualified faculty through HLC's criteria for accreditation and assumed practice B.2. These guidelines exceed the rigor of those required by the Ohio Department of Higher Education and subsequently guide all faculty credentialing decisions effective Fall 2017 and beyond. This complete policy is included in the revisions to the Policy and Information Manual provided to the Board of Trustees for annual approval. Dr. Roades will discuss further during the meeting.

Grants and Articulations

Ohio Revolving Loan Fund Continues to Support Truck Driving Academy

Notification from the Ohio Department of Higher Education recently indicated that Southern State will continue as an approved, eligible institution in the Ohio Means Jobs Workforce Revolving Loan Program for the Truck Driving Academy. The award is for \$250,000 for students to apply for loans for training offered through the Academy.

Martin and Penwell to Receive Recognition for Excellence in Teaching

Travis Martin, Assistant Professor for Business, and Toni Penwell, English Instructor, were recently nominated for the Southwestern Ohio Council for Higher Education (SOCHE) Excellence in Teaching Awards. This award exists to recognize the outstanding accomplishments of faculty who demonstrate excellence in teaching service and scholarship. These faculty members will be recognized publicly during a ceremony in Dayton on Nov. 3.

In addition to the SOCHE award, Mr. Martin and Dr. Don Storer were recently

recognized by students during the August All College Meeting. Receiving the Distinguished Teaching Award and the Lifetime Achievement Award respectively, these two faculty members were acknowledged for their outstanding efforts to support and encourage students.

Financial Aid V

Financial Aid Awarded 2016-17

Federal and state financial aid funds are being reconciled for the 2016-17 academic year. The following monies were received and disbursed for the year from the federal government and the Ohio Department of Education:

Fall Semester Financial Aid

The Financial Aid Office has processed to date more than 2,300 FAFSA applications for the current 2017-18 school year. This reflects a 10 percent increase from this date last academic year.

During the month of August alone, 593 FAFSA applications were received and processed for incoming students and 92 students completed student loan counseling sessions on campus.

College Credit Plus

For the current Fall Semester, we have 1132 students funded through CCP, attending from 45 high schools with 25 of those high schools offering one or more SSCC courses on their campus.
