Strategic Planning Engagement Update

On October 22, the consulting team from Bellwether was on-site to guide the Strategic Planning Steering Committee through the second work session. The objectives included:

- 1. Ensuring a shared understanding of Southern State's current state and market context
- 2. Interrogate and refine potential strategic priorities
- 3. Align on an approach to determine a "go-forward" program portfolio
- 4. Surface critical questions and next steps for phase 2

Included in your packet are relevant handouts that convey the common language we are using in this engagement, the project timeline, and a draft of the priorities guiding our continued work. Among the priority pillars include programs, students, and organization. Initiatives supporting these priorities are still in development and leaning toward the following: Programs:

- 1. Build a future-ready portfolio of programs
- 2. Shape a sustainable dual enrollment strategy

Students:

- Inspire increased enrollment
- Enhance student success and belonging

Organization:

- 5. Modernize operations
- 6. Strengthen people and culture

At this point in the engagement, I remain pleased with the guidance and insight of the Bellwether team. The interplay of our strategic enrollment planning engagement and this strategic planning effort is complementary, and I believe positioning the College well for bold action and measurable success in 2026 and beyond.

Dr. Bob Haas Leads Data Dive to Explore the New Post-Graduation Employment and Earning Component of the State Share of Instruction (SSI)

In the biennial budget (HB96), Governor DeWine allocated \$100 million to expand Ohio's

performance-based funding model (SSI) to include an employment outcomes component. Central to this new measure is the data available in the Post Secondary Employment Data tool available to us from the United States Census Bureau. Dr. Haas, a friend to Southern State and a highly regarded institutional effectiveness professional, joined us for the November Data Dive to assist the College in building our knowledge of the tool, the factors in data reporting, and the status of the new metrics implementation. The Data Dive session was well-attended, and the College is grateful for the reliable guidance of Dr. Haas.

Dr. Haas is the Chief Strategy Officer at Marion Technical College and the Director of Institutional Effectiveness for the Ohio Association of Community Colleges. Dr. Haas has been a good and generous friend to Southern State for many years, offering his insight and expertise in assessment, artificial intelligence, and, most recently, the PSEO component of SSI.

Reorganizing for Enrollment and Workforce Innovation

In the October report, I made mention of my intention to move forward with the addition of an Enrollment Management Director. Since that report and following the most recent developments in our strategic planning efforts, we are moving forward with this additional team member and reorganizing to more boldly prioritize enrollment and workforce as a major division within the College. While perhaps somewhat unconventional for a small college, this approach is intended to elevate the importance of attracting, enrolling, retaining, and positioning graduates for post-graduation success. This division will lead the effort to innovate in recruitment, enrollment management, and workforce partnerships. Priorities of this division include, among several others:

- 1. **Leading strategic enrollment management** Developing and implementing data-informed strategies to attract and retain students in credit and non-credit programs.
- 2. **Integrate services and processes** Coordinate admissions, recruiting, records, financial aid, and student onboarding to streamline the student experience from inquiry through completion.
- 3. **Foster collaboration** Work across divisions to align marketing, academic planning, and student support initiatives
- 4. Ensure data-driven decision making

The reorganization will not be complete until the first quarter of 2026. A revised organizational chart will be shared as appropriate following the onboarding of new team members and the

reassignment of others. While the reorganization is not budget-neutral, it is well within the parameters that were originally established when we planned to move forward more incrementally.

Southern State Honored to Host First Lady Fran DeWine's Roundtable on Dolly Parton Imagination Library

The College was honored to be called upon by Ohio First Lady, Fran DeWine, to host a Roundtable discussion with local literacy advocates regarding Highland County's participation in the Dolly Parton Imagination Library Initiative. In addition to guests from the Board of Commissioners, the Highland County Public Library, and ALTRUSA, Southern State was pleased to have representation from the Adult Opportunity Center. In addition to our participation in an important and worthwhile topic, the College was particularly honored that the First Lady would consider Southern State as a convening location.

ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Annual Program Advisory Committee Breakfast | Meetings

Fifty (50) advisory committee members, faculty, administrators, and staff were in attendance at the annual Advisory Committee event on Friday, October 31. Dr. Roades began with opening remarks—sharing SSCC current happenings and appreciation for the members' service on the committees. After a hearty breakfast catered by Rachel's House, Washington CH, Dr. Goodwin offered the charge to committees prior to departure for the various committee meetings. The purpose of Advisory Committees is to advise the College on current processes, methods, technological advancements, and industry trends to improve academic quality and meet the needs of the local employment community.

Participating Advisory Committees included: Business (Chair–**Jeff Tumbleson**); Computer Science (Chair–**Dr. Josh Montgomery**); Education (Chair–**Nicole Sheppard**); Human and Social Services (Chaired by–**Patricia Beach** and **Dr. Jeff Montgomery**); and Nursing (Chair– **Dr. Julianne Krebs**).

Nursing Updates

The department organized the Flu/COVID-19 Vaccine clinic provided in partnership with the Highland County Health Department on Central & Brown Campus on November 4, 5 & 13.

The students of the Practical Nursing Program are completing their final semester of the program. The students are demonstrating academic success, with the cohort completing standardized testing scores above the expected level of achievement for the Exit and Pharmacology exams. The group will continue to develop knowledge and skills over the remaining weeks of the semester.

The Nursing Department hosted tours and informational sessions for more than 100 high school students from Laurel Oaks Career Campus and Pickaway-Ross Career & Technology Center.

The dean visited East Clinton Middle School and provided a career session for approximately 80 students, and participated in a meeting of the Southern Hills Advisory Committee.

We'd like to acknowledge the outstanding work of Dean of Health Sciences, **Dr. Julie Krebs**, who will retire in December 2025. Thanks for your service, Dr. Krebs! We wish you well in retirement.

Faculty

On Friday, October 31, we held our most recent "Fifth Friday" event, which continues to serve as a valuable opportunity for collaboration and reflection on institutional priorities. In support of student learning and assessment, a comprehensive curriculum map has been developed. This map is designed to ensure that students are provided with clear and consistent opportunities to demonstrate achievement of the College's Institutional Outcomes prior to graduation.

In response to a request from GE Peebles, a group from Academic Affairs met to discuss employment opportunities and anticipated workforce needs. The company projects a need for up to 60 technicians over the next 12 to 18 months, presenting a significant opportunity for alignment between our academic programs and regional industry demands.

Progress also continues on the Compliant Syllabus Project, in accordance with Ohio Revised Code 3345.029. This initiative remains on track for completion early next spring, with a final deadline set for June. The project will ensure that



all course syllabi meet state compliance standards and reflect consistent academic expectations.

To promote sustainable and efficient workflows across the institution, we are leveraging existing systems—specifically Canvas—to streamline several faculty-related processes. These include assessment reporting, annual reviews, post-tenure evaluations, and professional development tracking. By centralizing these functions within Canvas, we aim to reduce reliance on paper-based documentation and improve overall organizational efficiency.

Celebrations and Events

Fall Transfer Fair

Promoting the Ohio Transfer Promise

SSCC's Fall Transfer Fair took place on October 29 in recognition of National Transfer Week. The primary objective of this event is to launch AA/AS students on their major career pathway during their first year and to help them understand the importance of completing their associate degree for maximum financial benefit. (This can equate between \$36,000 to \$70,000+ in college savings, depending on the transfer institution.) The Ohio Transfer Promise guarantees awarding transfer credit for the statewide set of transfer general education courses and designated major foundation courses.

The Spring Transfer Fair on March 25 will focus on 4-year technical partner pathways aligned with SSCC programs at our Central Campus in Hillsboro.

Ohio Technical Center (OTC) Degree Pathways

Promoting Degree Completion

The Ohio technical center degree pathways (ODHE Transfer) recognize the 900+ clock hours in OTC programs as 30 technical credit hours towards ATS degrees. Formerly referred to as the One-Year Option, the one-year OTC industry certification training is now guaranteed for a college credit award through Ohio public colleges. Southern State has 6 programs eligible for 3 – 30 credits toward ATS/AAB/AAS pathways. Current programs include Aviation Mechanics, Business Administration, Early Childhood Education, Manufacturing/Engineering, and Practical Nursing.

Instructional Technology

The Department of Instructional Technology continues to support academic excellence and student success through strategic initiatives, quality assurance, professional development, and instructional design support. Below is a combined summary of departmental activities and accomplishments for the month.

Dr. Angel Mootispaw, Director of Instructional Technology, spent the last couple of weeks onboarding the new part-time Instructional Designer and integrating the role into instructional design and faculty support operations.

The new Visiting Student application has been up for about a month; two students have completed the process for the Spring term.

Library

The Library team is pleased to report on a number of updates related to our **integrated library** system (ILS) migration.

After receiving our live instance of Ex Libris' Alma/Primo products (for library management and discovery) in mid-June, the Library team, alongside our inter- and extra-institutional

partners, spent the Summer ensuring that the systems would be user-ready for the start of the Fall semester. After configuring methods for authentication and patron uploads, completing additional system training, establishing workflows, and preparing a communication schedule for launch, Southern State Community College Library initiated our formal system go-live on August 18. In tandem with an update to our website, the system launched seamlessly, sunsetting our old Innovative Sierra platform, providing largely uninterrupted access to Library resources at the beginning of the semester.

Following go-live, the Library team broadcast these updates in a series of emails, listed below:

- 8/18: Library Update Announcement Faculty & Staff
- 8/20: Library Update Announcement Students
- 8/20: Library Account Instructions Faculty & Staff
- 8/27: Library Account Instructions Students

Additionally, members of the Library team presented a brief overview of these updates to faculty at the All-College Meeting on Tuesday, August 19. We also had the opportunity to share some of these updates ahead of go-live with adjunct faculty and CCP instructors, both virtually and in-person, during the Library Services session of the Adjunct | CCP Faculty Professional Development Event hosted by the College on July 23.

The Library team is committed to ongoing projects to improve elements of the system, including configuration and policy refinements for our loan rules, letters, patron uploads, and authentication. We also continue refining our use of Rapido, an integrated Ex Libris tool that expands our lending to academic libraries across the state. In December, Rapido will also provide a connection to all partnered public libraries. Beyond this, we continue to work on implementing other products we have access to consortially, including Alma Digital, the Library Mobile App, and Leganto.

- Alma Digital (Cohort 3 | implementation: week of 10/13/25 week of 12/15/25)
 - Per OhioLINK, Alma Digital is a "digital asset management (DAM) system that
 extends Ex Libris' Alma library services platform to handle the entire lifecycle of
 digital content—from deposit to delivery." Essentially, it will allow the Library to
 manage the digitization and digital lending of any and all relevant local
 materials.
- Library Mobile App (Wave 2 Cohort 2 | implementation: week of 11/5 week of 12/19)
 - OhioLINK describes the Library Mobile App as "a practical tool designed to help students and faculty engage more easily with [the] library's services and resources." It is a mobile app that will allow Library patrons (faculty, staff, and

students alike) to peruse Library resources conveniently, enabling us to provide services via the devices our community uses every day.

- Leganto (requested Wave 3 | implementation: April June 2026)
 - Leganto, as described by OhioLINK, is "an integrated course resource list management system that helps instructors create, manage, and share reading lists for courses by assembling various materials, including books, articles, and videos from the library's collections and the open web." This product will allow direct integration between Canvas and Library resources, enabling seamless, engaging connections to resources that support learning and affordable access.

In addition to these targeted configuration and implementation projects, the **Library Team Training Retreat** was hosted in Columbus, OH, August 13 – 15. All four members of the Library team attended, participating in meetings and events that enriched our work with ILS configuration as well as broader Library practices. Our itinerary included the following items:

- OhioLINK | Amy Pawlowski, Executive Director; Theda Schwing, Associate Director of Discovery and Delivery; Tasha Bryant-Willis, Member Support Coordinator; Laney Knight, Consortial Systems Librarian
 - Our Team joined OhioLINK staff for a consortia-wide Q&A session in the morning, and in the afternoon, we met for direct support and training related to Alma and Rapido. Many of the takeaways from this meeting have been key in refining our configurations within the new ILS to support the College community.
- <u>State Library of Ohio</u> | Mandy Knapp, Agency Executive Director & State Librarian; Ryan Burley, Director of Library Operations
 - Our Team was taken on a tour of the Library, which included an exploration of a number of archival and rare materials. Many of our questions regarding the updated lending practices across the state that have been in development alongside the ILS migration were addressed.
- <u>Columbus State Community College Library</u> | Dana Knott, Library Director; Hydy Cates, Electronic Resources Coordinator; Robin Buser, Acquisitions & Metadata Services
 - Our Team was invited to sit in on staff training sessions regarding the new Ex
 Libris products, which included presentations on innovative integrations and
 best practices. We also received a guided tour of the Library facilities.
- <u>Ohioana Library</u> | Kimberlee Kiehl, Executive Director; Kathryn Powers, Assistant Director; Courtney Brown, Librarian
 - Our Team visited the Library during an Open House event which featured a curated collection of Library materials. We learned about Ohio authors and

- collected additional information about relevant projects we can engage in and promote locally.
- OhioNet | Matt Polcyn, Director Technology Services; Heidi Beke-Harrigan, Library Operations Analyst; Chris Deems, Library Systems Support Specialist; Spencer Lamm, Library Systems Analyst
 - Our Team met with several staff members at OhioNet, who took a great deal of time to address questions and concerns we presented regarding the ILS implementation. They offered guidance, particularly as related to the more technical elements of our inquiries, and explained the sorts of tasks we may anticipate as we further refine our processes.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Computer Science Renovation Project

BHDP has completed the Construction Documents (CD) phase for the Computer Science renovation project. The bidding period for the project will take place from December 8 to January 15. An in-person pre-bid meeting and walkthrough will be held on December 15. Construction is expected to begin on March 24, 2026, and be completed by October 16, 2026.

Building Renovation

Renovation efforts are progressing smoothly. Drywall, painting, flooring, lighting, and new ceiling tiles have all been completed. Work will soon begin on restroom renovations, cabinets, blinds, and cove base installation.

This project aims to transform the former daycare space into a modern environment designed to support expanded classroom and office use for the Adult Opportunity Center, Workforce Development training, and other community meetings and events.

Special thanks to **Loren O'Cull** (Facilities Manager), **Jeff Knauff** (Facilities Technician), and **Steve Bikowsky** (Maintenance) for their outstanding contributions to this project.

Capital Appropriations/Reappropriations

All state agencies in Ohio are required to submit a long-term capital improvements plan before

each capital budget cycle. Capital projects include costs related to acquiring, constructing, renovating, or equipping facilities. Additionally, the Ohio Constitution limits appropriations to a two-year period, which means agencies must request reappropriation to carry forward any unspent capital funds into the next biennium.

Southern State Community College has submitted a formal request to reappropriate approximately \$5.68 million in unspent capital funds for the FY 2027–2028 biennium. This request follows the state's reappropriation process and includes all required elements: a six-year funding summary, detailed breakdowns of each appropriation line item (ALI), narrative justifications explaining the need for continued funding, and supporting documentation such as community project updates and an encumbrance review worksheet.

C32234 & C32233 – IT Centers of Excellence: Funds will complete renovations of computer science labs and classrooms to support technology and cybersecurity education.

C32232 – Ohio Christian University Organic Chemistry Labs: A community partnership project delayed due to administrative hurdles; funds will support lab construction for rural medical training.

C32229 – Campus Safety Grant Program: Supports critical safety upgrades like emergency generators and access control systems.

C32228 – Workforce-Based Training & Equipment (RAPIDS): Enables continued investment in workforce development and STEM education through equipment purchases and training.

C32225 – Campus Security Systems Project: Funds reserved for cybersecurity and physical safety improvements, supplementing expiring grant resources.

C32200 – Basic Renovations: Covers essential infrastructure upgrades including HVAC, roofing, and lab renovations.

Three Southern State Adult Opportunity Center staff members attended the Ohio Association for Adult and Continuing Education (OAACE) annual fall conference in Columbus, October 22–24,

joining representatives from all 55 Ohio Aspire programs. A special session on October 22 addressed data collection during new student registration and orientation, timely given the launch of online registration through the state portal. Additional sessions covered workforce development, community partnerships, student success and retention, AI, and advocacy for adult education funding.

The first state data pull of FY26 was completed in October. The results showed the program above the state average in all targets.

Choose Ohio First

On October 22, the new students in the Choose Ohio First (COF) Cohort and those in the first cohort attended a reception organized by COF organizer, Strategic Support Specialist **Lisa Hord**. The students were fed and given some networking time with members of the College



leadership, faculty, and staff. This year's cohort includes Michael Gillespie of Lake Waynoka, Quinton Dick of Peebles, Grant Hill of Mt. Orab, and Skylar Van Rubio of Williamsburg.

Ohio Code Scholar

The deadline for the 2025-2026 participation in the Coder project this year has passed, and while additional numbers are still being reported, the student participation count is 1,550 with 1,361 projects. There are 52 teachers participating in the project and 43 schools.




